

Watching migrating seabirds can be immensely rewarding and it did not take me long after moving here to realise that Downderry has much to offer. You can get closer to the birds at headlands such as Rame, but our stretch of coast is not to be outdone. In theory stormy conditions with a south-westerly wind offer the best opportunities, especially in summer and autumn, when birds such as shearwaters are regular and the diminutive petrels a possibility. I have a theory that birds heading west come closer to land than expected because of the width of Whitsand Bay and only veer away as they sight Looe Island. This is long enough to witness large numbers on passage. There is the opportunity to observe dolphins and porpoises as well.

This October the weather has been typically changeable. On one day of light rain, murk and poor visibility, I noted many seabirds offshore including hundreds of Kittiwakes. These small gulls are highly pelagic and some will cross the Atlantic to spend the winter. Occasionally they are accompanied by Arctic Skuas, the pirates of the sea, which are intent on harassing the gulls until any food is regurgitated. Many of the Gannets I observe will be on their way to the Bay of Biscay or beyond, but others remain close to our coastline and on many days recently large numbers have been diving into the sea, attracted by shoals of fish. Another seabird I note is the Common Scoter, a species of duck that spends the winter in the sheltered bays of Cornwall. Its nearest breeding outpost is in northern Scotland. It is important not to ignore inshore activity and suddenly I catch sight of a Merlin, our smallest falcon, as it skims over the shoreline, a rare event here.

Later in the day I return and the rain has stopped. I am pleased to note a few Swallows flying overhead. These are stragglers on their way south. Then just offshore a real surprise, a flock of eight Brent Geese. I usually see these winter visitors from the Arctic on sheltered estuaries such as those at Torpoint, but I cannot remember seeing any before on the open sea. Yet they seem perfectly at home and swim slowly to the west.

Of course, the weather conditions do not always help. On a cloudless morning the later sunrise and low angle of the sun make sea watching difficult as the surface takes on a glassy shimmer and fishing boats appear to tremble. Even the Eddystone Lighthouse hovers above the sea. This is when it is worthwhile to turn inland and focus on a different habitat. Hedgerows offer a little shelter from the wind. There are the usual garden birds, eager to put on weight as winter approaches, but where hedges are southfacing and contain ivy, the vegetation is audibly alive with several insects especially hoverflies. There are still a few butterflies to be seen, especially Red Admiral and Speckled Wood, and in a few favoured spots the Ivy Bee is still to be found. This species is the last solitary bee to emerge in the year and is encountered only in late summer and early autumn. Unsurprisingly, ivy is the main source of pollen and nectar. Considering that the species colonised England only at the beginning of the century, it has increased its range dramatically and provides a welcome success story in contrast to the general decline in numbers of insects. News from County Hall

Cornwall Council's Cabinet agreed last month to reinstate the council tax recovery processes. Quay Lane Surgery – St Germans and Downderry

- Patient Participation Group (PPG)

The Quay Lane PPG is a group of volunteer patients working closely with the practice to improve communication and understanding between the practice team and patients. We will regularly keep you informed over the winter with news from Debbie Todd the Practice Manager and with more information about the PPG and how we fund medical and ancillary equipment not provided by the NHS. With the help of many volunteers who have recently joined us, we continue to provide support to the practice and the most vulnerable patients, delivering medication on a regular basis. The new flooring at Downderry Surgery has been fitted at last! Thank you so much to Deviock Parish Council for jointly funding this with us and making it possible.

Practice News

We are delighted to announce that our Portacabin is equipped and ready to go, huge thanks to our Patient Participation Group for funding the furniture and equipment.

Our Nursing Team are running our flu campaign from the cabin, utilising it well; their first super Saturday clinic for over 65's was a huge success. We have a variety of flu clinics arranged for patients over 65s and those in an at risk group aged 64 and under. They are staggered to fit in with our vaccine deliveries so please be patient if you have to wait. If you have not done so already, then please ring the surgery to arrange your appointment; we are expecting a larger than normal uptake this year. We are unable to offer vaccinations at present to patients aged 50–64 unless you have an underlying health condition. Information about vaccinating this group will be posted on our website and Facebook page once we have received guidance from NHS England.

As we move into the second wave of COVID-19 it is vital that we manage patients with 'Winter Bugs' and reduce footfall into the surgery to keep it COVID safe for staff and patients. The consulting room in the cabin, as we head into the winter season, will be used to see patients presenting with respiratory symptoms and the admin room will be utilised by our Dispensary team. With this in mind we are changing the way that you collect your medication from the practice.

From Monday 9th November all medication (except for controlled drugs) will be available to collect from the Portacabin between 9.30am and 12.30pm Monday to Friday (times may change depending on staffing levels). Whilst we will encourage you to collect during these times, you will still be able to collect your medication from the main surgery outside these times. However, there may be a wait as we are limited to the number of patients that can safely be in the surgery at any one time. Medication collections from Downderry surgery will not be affected. We ask that you allow 5 working days from ordering to collection and slightly longer if you are collecting from Downderry. Please bear in mind that the team processes over 8,000 items per month which averages about 370 prescriptions every day. The dispensary will continue to be closed between 1 – 3pm Monday to Friday.

We are experiencing a higher than average number of calls into the practice every day, so please only contact us if it is necessary. You can contact the surgery via other means by using E-Consult, Patient Access or e-mail. If you provide the surgery with your mobile number then we will endeavour to text you when your medication is ready; we will also text you with appointment reminders and for booking routine reviews. Please ensure that your personal details are kept up to date.

Latest News about Buses and Trains

Train services continue to run effectively, and social distancing is generally straightforward, except perhaps at school travel times. Look out for some changes on the branch lines in the months to come because of engineering work. There will be bus replacements for all services on the <u>Gunnislake line</u> (stations between Bere Ferrers and Gunnislake) Monday 16th November to Thursday 19th November and the <u>Looe line</u> Saturday 7th November, Monday 9th and Tuesday 10th. In early December there will be engineering works in West Cornwall beyond Truro on the main and St Ives lines.

I reported last month on school buses. Transport for Cornwall have agreed that the early morning 75 bus (7.24 Liskeard, 7.45 at Seaton) will carry members of the general public as far as Crafthole (arrival 8 a.m.). At that time the 70 bus connects with the 75 at Crafthole, and will carry passengers on to Torpoint and Plymouth (arrival 9.06).

Back in what seems like another world in some ways, we reported in March about trainbus connections for people in the Rame peninsula, and particularly about the fact that there is no bus service to St Germans station from Crafthole, Downderry, Seaton, Hessenford, Sheviock etc. You probably know that weekdays there are currently over 20 trains a day each way that stop at St Germans station, and almost as many on Saturdays. Early in the year, we had positive discussions with GWR, Transport for Cornwall buses and Cornwall Council about doing a study of the Rame peninsula as a whole to try to find a way of creating better public transport connexions to the station from the various population clusters, so that more people could benefit from the frequent trains. Buses and trains will have a vital role to play in a green recovery and a fair, healthy, sustainable future. We suggested that there might be some normal bus services, some use of community buses perhaps, and the possible introduction of a demand-responsive service between the Rame Peninsula and St. Germans station, using minibuses which could be ordered by phone. Whichever approach was taken there might be a combined bus and train ticket.

Then the Covid epidemic hit us, and everyone's minds became occupied with other priorities. It is clear now that we will be living under these different circumstances for a while, and we should, perhaps, be starting again to look at how local public transport could be organised in a more effective way.
