The rising sun continues its slow, imperceptible movement south beyond the tip of the Rame peninsula. There are still a few more weeks before it appears to stall at the winter solstice and we anticipate its apparent return northwards. Until then the daylight reduces minute by minute and we have to make the most of what remains. This morning is spectacular as the fuzzily edged sun emerges behind a cumulus cloud whose crest is glinted yellow. Above, horizontal lines of pink and orange clouds reflect the light. Within ten minutes the show is over and I concentrate on activity on the shiny, shimmering sea.

Birds are few and scattered – the ponderous, black silhouettes of Cormorants more obvious than the odd Gannet or Kittiwake. There are no Great Northern Divers, yet two days ago, I came across a loose group of seven birds, newly arrived from Iceland or beyond. That is a good number for November. These large birds were lounging on the surface, occasionally taking it in turns to dive. As I scanned the ocean there was the frustratingly brief, but noticeable profile of a Harbour Porpoise. I waited without luck for it to reappear. Compared to dolphins, this species is smaller and scarcely breaks the surface. Today, no diver and no porpoise.

Having surveyed the ocean, I spend a little time observing activity along the road on the way home. There seems to be no sign of winter as the mild autumn persists. With little wind, leaves continue to hang on and there are still a few flowers in bloom. I was still collecting raspberries until a few days ago and the leaves of spring bulbs are already emerging. Deep within a bush there is the sharp, emphatic call of a Blackcap, a regular winter visitor from central Europe. This species will build up its numbers into the new year.

Blackbirds chase one another across the road, jostling for position as they move from one bush to another. The sound of Chaffinch, Dunnock, Blue Tit and Jackdaw add to the mix. There is a tick sound and a Robin emerges, posing for its Christmas card. It is one of the few birds that continue to sing into winter though the song is different from that in summer.

I am looking out for an uncommon winter visitor, the Firecrest, but there is no sign yet of this diminutive bird. I expect to see one or two each winter. No winter thrushes from Scandinavia either, though Redwings and Fieldfares have been seen elsewhere in Cornwall.

I count nine Collared Doves perched on a line close together. Nothing unusual in that, but I am reminded that this sedentary species was unknown in Britain until the 1950s. It is easy to take for granted such a ubiquitous bird, but breeding was first confirmed in Norfolk only in 1955, following a rapid expansion across western Europe before the war. We know that the species has profited from the availability of free grain, livestock feed and weed-seed. The initial spread predates global warming but no doubt milder winters have helped to maintain its hold here.

Seaton land purchase: The Parish Council exchanged contracts on 4.7 acres of woodland at the sea end of Seaton valley in November. Originally scheduled for public auction, it was secured during pre-auction negotiations following a successful emergency crowdfunding campaign using public donations and earmarked reserves for land. Chair Mark Gibbons said: "I would like to thank all in the community who contributed so generously to this appeal, and Cornwall Wildlife Trust for its endorsement, as well as Cllr Armand Toms and all at Cornwall Council who responded rapidly and effectively to support the remarkable and tireless efforts of Parish Councillors on the ground. We had less than two weeks to save this land and we are delighted that it is now protected for the benefit of residents, visitors and future generations. We will now be working with Cornwall Wildlife Trust on a sustainable, long term management plan for this habitat and its wildlife."



Patient Participation Group (PPG)

Social Prescriber Link Worker Jessica Hirons has been at Quay Lane Surgery now for 2 years and holds appointments on Thursdays. She offers a huge lifeline within our community by linking people with the support they need; from respite services for carers, cancer care and long-term health support - to people with poor health linked to housing, unemployment, debt management and weight management, to name a few. Social Prescribing can help you access a wealth of services to improve both mental and physical health; meet new people or learn a new skill depending on what you might need and what services and resources are available. This might include social isolation and befriending services, bereavement, accessing legal advice, emotional wellbeing, and mental health support.

To access Social Prescribing, simply ring the surgery to book an appointment. Home visits can also be arranged. Jessica also has a weekly drop-in Wellbeing Hub at Torpoint Library on Wednesday afternoons (1-3) where all are welcome and is hoping to extend this service with a monthly pop-up wellbeing hub in Downderry, St Germans, Millbrook and Cawsand from January. These sessions offer an extension of the support mentioned above plus mindful arts and crafts, digital support, and the opportunity to have a cuppa and a chat. Covid Boosters. If you are eligible (must be a minimum of 6 months since your 2nd vaccination) then please contact the surgery after 10am Monday to Friday to book your appointment. COVID boosters are taking place at Saltash Football Club every two weeks. Alternatively, upon invitation from the NHS, eligible patients can book an appointment either online or via 119 to book at a mass vaccination centre or find out about one of the other local options that may be available.

<u>Flu Vaccinations</u>. Appointments are now being made for both the over 65 and eligible under 65 flu vaccination age groups. Please contact the surgery if you have not already booked your appointment.

<u>Face coverings</u>. We must remind patients again that there is a requirement to wear a face covering in all NHS buildings to include St. Germans and Downderry Surgery. We also ask that you wear a face covering when collecting medication from the Portacabin. If you are exempt then please make this known to the team before attending the surgery so that alternative arrangements can be put in place.

NHS staff still need to isolate if a household member has COVID which impacts on our staffing levels. Please help to keep our vulnerable patients and team members safe by not attending the surgery if you have any cough/cold symptoms and please continue to wear a face covering. Thank you for your assistance.

Superfast Broadband. DaSRA committee member, Caroline Frith, together with Caroline Walmsley want to thank local people for the excellent turnout for the Superfast Broadband Information meeting in the Village Hall on Monday 15th November. Representatives from both Openreach and Superfast Cornwall were there to give an overview, and answer questions, on the project which will bring Government funding to help Downderry and Seaton upgrade to Superfast fibre to the premises (FTTP). Interest in the project seems to be strong and, at the time of writing, the pledge level is at 54% - thanks to all those who have already 'got on board'...it would be great if we could encourage all our friends and neighbours to do the same. We do need to almost double the current number of 'signups' in order for the project to go ahead before the Government grant scheme becomes suspended early in January 2022. Ideally, we are aiming to get 100% support by mid-December. Alternatively, there is a lot of very helpful Q&As being dealt with on the DaSRA Facebook page by another Openreach representative - Broadband Geraint - who is also part of the project team. Community Notice Board. The Notice Board in the centre of the village, next to Downderry Stores, is in a dilapidated state. Sadly, over the years it has been neglected and is an eye sore. It is in a prime site, in easy view of passers-by and therefore a great place for community groups to advertise their activities. DaSRA has taken on the responsibility to replace and maintain it. Deviock Parish Council has kindly granted to part fund the cost of a new one so we hope to have it replaced in the New Year.

<u>Farewells</u>. Heather Blacker, a long-term active resident, is leaving Downderry, and The Zone's weekly coffee morning gives an appropriate setting to say Au Revoir as she moves to live in Liskeard. We hope she will visit us often. Heather played a leading role with members of the Downderry Methodist Church to save its future by developing the use of the church as a community centre, offering a much-needed venue in our active village. The Zone Committee would welcome all residents who have known Heather over the years to the Zone from 10.00am on Wednesday 8 December. We are sure many memories will be shared.

Downderry & Seaton Community Fund. Many residents will recall when our local Post Office was threatened with closure in 2016. A fund was launched to secure its continuation for a further two years, after which a self-financing outreach service took over, and continues to this day. That fund is still being supported by some residents, and the D & S Community Fund grows month by month as a "fighting fund" to protect community assets of value to our quality of life. Last month, when 4.5 acres of Seaton woodland was being auctioned off with potential for "low-income generation", our Parish Council launched a crowdfunding appeal to take the site into public ownership and create a wildlife woodland. It proved to be an example of how, with little warning, the community took an opportunity to act quickly and take control. Appreciating that its success in raising sufficient funds would go to the wire, DaSRA's Management Committee stayed in close contact with DPC as we assessed if the threat posed to the site if sold to a developer would meet the criteria established for D & S Community Fund. We decided it did. In the final hours, a donation of £2000 was made from the Community Fund and, as we now know, the bid was accepted and this land is now in public ownership, secured for the long term to be a wildlife woodland - a real coming together of the community, getting behind this initiative of Deviock Parish Council. Downderry and Seaton Neighbourhood Watch (in partnership with DaSRA)

Over the recent weeks, some residents have received a letter through the postal system promoting Nextdoor Deviock. One example was sent with the greeting *Hi West Camps Bay Neighbour*. It describes a neighbourhood hub for useful information, connecting neighbours in need with those who can help. The letter has no signature, just a first name, a local area, no date, and, importantly, no contact details. The letter asks that a Nextdoor App is downloaded, and gives a joining code. Downderry and Seaton Neighbourhood Watch has no specific information about Nextdoor Deviock so we checked to see if national Neighbourhood Watch knew of this Nextdoor App. They advise us that the App's company is registered in the USA and stress our residents should be aware that it is, therefore, not subject to our UK Data Protection Act which

restricts companies on how they can use the data they collect. It is always worth remembering the general warning that is included on Devon and Cornwall Police/Neighbourhood Watch communications. Do not respond to any unsolicited request to download an App unless you can verify, and are satisfied with, the source behind it.

Frauds /Scams are on the increase. Neighbourhood Watch continually updates the information it holds on the different types of fraud being experienced by the general public. In last month's Nut Tree, we listed a wide range of scams that are being reported to the police, and we keep information updated on the Neighbourhood Watch pages of www.dasra.co.uk. As we approach the Christmas season, we again advise residents to look out for indications that an email, phone call, text message, or doorstep caller may not be genuine. For example: Charity scams: Scammers will call claiming to be collecting money for charity and either pocket your donation or use personal details to access bank accounts. Courier scams: Courier scams usually consist of two parts; firstly, scammers will cold call, claiming to be from the bank or other authority and persuade you to tell them your PIN and your address. Then they will send a fraudulent courier to your house to pick up your bank card. Impersonation of UK officials: Criminals impersonate UK officials to obtain personal information and steal money, often claiming that you are due a refund or must make an urgent payment. Bank scams: Scammers may call you on the telephone or send you a text message purporting to be from your bank to say that your bank account has been fraudulently accessed and therefore, a new 'safe' account is opened that you should transfer your money into.

Always REMEMBER: your bank will NEVER contact you out of the blue to ask for your PIN, full password, or move money to another account. Payment scams: Emails or telephone calls purporting to be from genuine suppliers updating their bank details and quickly requesting an invoice. Doorstep fraud: Fraudsters try to scam you after knocking on your door. They might be pretending to collect money for charity or offering to sell you overpriced or substandard products or services, such as home improvements. In the case of rogue traders, they will call uninvited and offer to do some work on your roof, driveway, or garden.







Simple Ways to Save the Planet

I can't believe it's that time of year again! But as it is, here are some top tips for reducing your carbon footprint at Christmas.

Decorate with greenery. Take secateurs and cut what you find in hedges. Chances are the birds will have eaten the holly berries, but leylandii, privet, sage, rosemary, rosehips, Christmas tree trimmings etc will scent and embellish your house beautifully.



Buy second-hand decorations, or re-use old ones. For me, one of the highlights of the season is unwrapping the battered fairy that once was Dad's when he was a child. There's a camel a friend bought me when we were in primary school, and little decorated stars made by the children when they were young. Each decoration has a story. Homemade decorations make good presents too; simple things to make include brightly coloured pom-poms from left over wool, pinecones painted gold or decorated eggs (I stick the ribbon on with superglue and then cover the join by threading it through a small circle of fabric). And if you feel the need for more tinsel, there's usually plenty in charity shops at this time of year.

I also raid charity shops for fun cracker gifts. Making your own crackers is the easiest thing. Cut up thin card (old cereal boxes are perfect) and staple them to make the inner. Fill with a joke, a gift and if you've the energy a homemade paper hat. (I get around this by attaching raffle ticket to hats we already own and putting a ticket in the cracker). Wrap your inner with newspaper, which can be decorated with stickers, greenery, paint, or left plain (I get a Financial Times as the colour is pretty). Tie with ribbon or strips of brightly coloured rag (which can be reused afterwards.) It's easy to source cracker pulls online but we find it's just as fun to shout bang loudly.

Finally, another shout out for Christmas to be the season of localism. Now is the perfect time to buy from local sources; know which farm your food came from, support your independent shops. Go for a walk and immerse yourself in your local winter landscape. Run about in the rain. Call on your neighbours to say hello. Invite someone around who might otherwise be alone. Because nothing is quite as seasonal as the warm glow of sharing time together in singing and games, and that's just what we need to nourish the soul as we head into another new year.

St Germans & Area Public Transport Group

The big train news is that the December to May train timetable begins on Sunday 12th December. The biggest changes are in Sunday trains. There will be 13 Sunday trains each way throughout the period, including the 0751 from Paddington (1156 at St Germans) and the 1803 from Paddington (2131 at St Germans); also the last Sunday east-bound train will be the 2132 from Penzance (2311 at St Germans). Sunday excursions by train will be much easier from now - let's make use of the new services!

Watch out for several minor time changes on weekdays and Saturdays. Printed copies of the timetable have been distributed and you will find them in shops, pubs, etc. and at the station. Contact me if you can't get hold of one.

Be careful in the first week of the new timetable, however, as there are scheduled engineering works from 13-16 December. Buses will replace trains between Truro and Penzance, including the St Ives Bay Line. And for St Germans, an amended hourly train service will continue to run between Truro and Plymouth (with minor alterations further into Devon). Thus, several trains on the published timetable will not be running on those four days - so check carefully before travelling.

As usual, there will be no GWR services on Christmas Day and Boxing Day. The network at the end of December is largely unchanged - but there will be engineering work involving Bristol Parkway and the area up to Gloucester from 25-31 December.

Further engineering work is scheduled for the new year: Sunday 23 to Sunday 30 January, there will be work on the Par to Newquay line, meaning that buses will replace trains between St Austell and Newquay. All weekends in February: Exeter St Davids to Plymouth engineering works.

Thanks to those giving donations to the Public Transport Group in the St German Community shop box in November. And thanks to those buying books from our stall at the Eliot Hall table-top sale - the proceeds went to the group's funds (which were rather depleted as a result of loss of grants during the Covid crisis). That means that in addition to the train timetable we're able to print some local 71 and 75 bus timetables again, which will be available in local shops etc.

Over the next few months there are likely to be improved bus services both in Cornwall and Plymouth, with reduced fares and enhanced services. Money is being made available by Government to embark on Bus Improvement Plans. We hope in future reports to give some details.

Also, a rallying cry for the Community Bus **300 Club.** Please join.
