Scanning across the ocean for signs of wildlife can be fairly predictable, despite seasonal changes. For example, one can be reasonably certain of seeing Gannets on any day in the year, though numbers are substantially reduced in winter when most have headed south. Other birds such as gulls are always around though the proportions of different species vary. At present the young Herring Gulls are moving from rooftops to the beach and the number of Black-headed Gulls that have bred elsewhere is building up along our coast. Of course, the predictability of observations is vital because it proves that the environment is behaving. If I did not have these regular observations, I would get worried. On the other hand, when the unexpected encounter happens, it is immensely rewarding.

On one clear morning in June, visibility is good across the calm, silvery sea as I peer out. Nothing unusual amongst the birds, though numbers are low. Suddenly the dorsal fin of a dolphin comes into view, but I recognize immediately that this does not belong to a Bottle-nosed or Common Dolphin, the species normally observed here. The tall, dark, curved fin contrasts with the paleness of the upper body, indicative of a male Risso's Dolphin. Then I note a few other fins, all belonging to a family group of different-sized individuals. They are moving very slowly, mainly submerged as I follow their westerly progress. Older individuals of the species are the palest and help to give it the alternative name of Grey Dolphin. Their bodies show haphazard, whitish streaks, blotches or scarring. It is thought that the scars are the result of fighting or play among individuals. Bites from squid may also be involved.

There is no active breaching or acrobatics as in other species noted in the bay and it is frustrating not to see the full length of the body. Eventually, after many minutes of observation, I manage to see the blunt, almost white head and tapering tail of the hefty, ghostly male. Its size might remind one of a Killer Whale. In fact, Risso's Dolphins are the largest of their type with a length of nearly four metres. The species is more typical of the deeper water of the continental shelf, so I am very pleased to witness this passage close to home. The only other observation I have had of this species of dolphin was off Rame Head when a similar family group came within metres of the coast. I did not see the individuals that moved up the Tamar and surfaced off Torpoint many years ago, a very unusual record.

Thinking about the observation later, I am reminded that I have not seen the other two species of dolphin recently, or a Harbour Porpoise, a smaller cetacean. Perhaps it is bad luck, or not being in the right place at the right time. Yet I know that the oceans are always under threat from pollution and over-fishing and I cannot hide a tinge of worry.

Greetings to you all. Council business seems at times to be glacial in movement but there is a lot going on behind the scenes. 30 months have passed since we started negotiation with Port Eliot Estate to renew the lease on the Tideford playpark for 10 years, things go back and forth between solicitors and costs go up, but we would like to reassure residents that as soon as the lease is signed by the ward Councillor works should proceed apace with consultation on any new ideas you might wish included.

We have started research on what will be needed in St Germans when 20mph speed limits can change (trials are going on in Cornwall). Traffic calming measures will probably be necessary, and we hope to have a public meeting about the choices as soon as we have the Feasibility Study plans in draft form, probably in September.

Polbathic will be changing when the work starts on the Brenton Works site. This might mean enlarging the car park, new bus shelter and a pedestrian crossing, EV spaces, Disabled space etc. as soon as we know what is actually possible there will be a village meeting to discuss the options before the plans are agreed or moved on to the next stage. We are also looking at Emergency Planning for the Parish or local communities and would like some help with this please so if you can get in touch via the website or email the Clerk on <u>clerk@stgermansparishcouncil.gov.uk</u> and get involved after all you know more about the resources available in each area for help like places for shelter etc. it might not be needed but it is best to be prepared.

There are rumours of a bus reduction planned for September and we are all trying to avoid the problem of no consultation which happened before.

Forthcoming meetings in August and September (to take place at The Zone, Downderry Methodist Church): August: no Full Council meeting; Planning Committee 18th Aug 6.30pm. September: Full Council 8th Sept 7.30pm; Planning Committee 22nd Sept 6.30pm. Social distancing and reduced capacity will continue to apply. See Agendas for details prior to each meeting.

<u>Highways</u>: Further to submitting Expressions of Interest to Cornwall Council for the funding of various highways projects around the parish, we have received the news that there will be some financial support for the Keveral Mill 'pinch point' and a Seaton 'gateway', both on Hessenford road. Other works due to take place are the installation of a speed visor at Seaton and the repainting of the yellow lines outside the Zone in Downderry.

<u>Bathing survey</u>: The Parish Council is in the process of requesting bathing water designation for River Seaton. (The coastal water is already designated.) The first part of this process is a bathing survey to evaluate activity/usage at peak times during the summer season. The RNLI is kindly undertaking this survey at Seaton on our behalf from July to September, given coastguards' presence on the beach over this period.

<u>Co-option (Seaton Ward vacancy)</u>: Notices will be going up soon, so please keep an eye out on our website and noticeboards if you are interested in becoming a Councillor. Please note you don't have to live in Seaton itself to be a Seaton Councillor; email the Clerk if you would like further information on what being a Councillor involves.

<u>Planning applications</u>: The Parish Council has submitted two planning applications to Cornwall Council. The first application is for Changing Places Toilets (next to the existing public toilets in Seaton), an accessible portable building for those who require additional support, with space for one person and their carer. We will shortly be receiving government capital funds for the CPT after a successful bid. The second application is for the tank traps project, to include moving the traps from the beach to the green at Seaton, and erecting a heritage information board. We have received £500 from the Heritage Trust to contribute towards this project.

<u>September Bus Changes</u>. There will be a number of changes in bus routes and times in September. The 75 service will operate every two hours, but will no longer serve Great Park. The bus will arrive in Liskeard before 10.00 a.m. (0947) - responding to feedback at the June public meeting. We have been told that there will no longer be a 75A St Germans bus to Plymouth, as not enough passengers have been using the service. There will still be a morning and afternoon school bus, however. Cornwall Council are in ongoing negotiations with Saltash Red Bus to provide some feeder buses in the East Cornwall area. We will continue to attempt to get a service through St Germans, Polbathic etc that will suit people's needs - but I fear it will take some time for anything to be achieved.

<u>Trains.</u> Further strikes have been scheduled for August (18^{th} and 20^{th}), depending on negotiations. There will be some fairly minor changes in the timetable from September 17^{th} .

<u>Public Transport Survey</u> We are pleased that a good number of you have responded and we are grateful for any further comments you might have. We have begun to look at the responses, and will be publicising an analysis and report in the autumn. Almost 400 people responded to the survey, train and bus users, and some who did not use public transport but had views they wanted to share. What follows is a brief early comment on the results.

There was overwhelming support for a well-connected public transport system, linking villages etc to ferries, St Germans station, to market towns etc. There was also a wish to be able to get from an inland location to the sea. Of those people using St Germans station, 60% travelled by car. 35% used public transport to get to work or education, BUT there were frequent comments about NOT being able to get to work using public transport - for many it was that there is not an early enough bus or train. Clearly bus and train users generally appreciated having public transport. However, lots of people commented on matters of reliability (buses or trains delayed or cancelled) and mentioned high fares. There were also negative comments about the lack of connection between modes of transport.
